Annual report of the Marvin & Sybil Weiner Spirit of America Collection

(covering the academic years 2020-2024)

The Marvin & Sybil Weiner Spirit of America Collection is comparable in scope and content to the collections of the American Antiquarian Society and the Library Company of Philadelphia. Originally inspired to emulate the personal libraries of men like Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson and John Adams, Marvin Weiner spent a lifetime collecting the books and pamphlets that a colonial gentleman would have owned. Taking great care to purchase the same editions that were available in 18th century America, Mr. Weiner eventually amassed a collection of more than 13,000 books, pamphlets, government publications, newspapers and serials, including rare works from as early as the 16th century.

The Weiner Spirit of America digital collection includes more than 800 almanacs, documents, speeches, letters from the Marvin & Sybil Weiner Spirit of America Pamphlets Collection which comprises more than 50 archival boxes housed in Florida Atlantic University's Libraries' Special Collections & Archives.



In **2020/2021** school year, (COVID) the Collection was utilized in several different ways:

• Isabel Hidalgo, a student intern, created an online exhibition for the Weiner Collection, titled "The Morning Star of that Liberty": Controversy and Conflict in Early American Press, 1735-1805.

Documents of Democracy: Founding a New Nation: Democratic origins for America first began in England during the 13th century. The first document to lay the foundations for English constitutional government was the Magna Carta, which established that monarchs were subject to the laws of the realm, and it served to restrain the excesses of the monarchy. Until the signing of the Magna Carta, European rulers relied on the tradition of "divine right" to govern. Magna Carta established significant civil liberties and rights that have a direct connection to the U.S. Constitution and Bill of Rights. Through the rare books and pamphlets found in the Marvin & Sybil Weiner Spirit of America Collection, this exhibit examines the documents, letters, and books that have inspired the ideas of freedom and democracy within the United States.

Between the Waves: Finding Ocean Curiosities: The world's oceans are teeming with living plants and animals, artifacts that chronicle human interaction with the sea, and now unfortunately, pollution. Items such as sea glass and shells interest collectors and those who consider themselves beachcombers. Many of the shells on display are from Florida shores and represent only a small variety of the curiosities that lie between the waves.



Highlights from the Printing and Mind of Man Exhibition: In 1963, the International Printing Machinery and Allied Trades Exhibition (IPEX) held an exhibition in London entitled: Printing and the Mind of Man (PMM). Since that hallmark exhibition, PMM catalogue is considered an essential framework for many private collectors and libraries. Back by popular demand, we are celebrating the Printing and the Mind of Man catalog featuring books from the Marvin and Sybil Weiner Collection. We are showcasing the most influential texts that have greatly contributed to Western Civilization over the past 500 years since the invention of the printing press.

Pamphleteer in America: This unique exhibit uses items from the Marvin and Sybil Weiner Spirit of America Collection to highlight the writings of brave men and women in the original thirteen colonies who spoke out against the tyrannical King George III of Great Britain. The colonists' writings were published in newspapers of the time, read aloud in public houses, taverns, and in town squares. Pamphlets served to educate Americans regarding the need for independence and fueled the fire of revolution. On display are many of their works including Thomas Paine's famous work, Common Sense.

NATIONAL SUMMER INSTITUTE (\$141,929.00 Federal grant)

In 2022, FAU Libraries hosted a coveted three-week NEH Summer Institute for Higher Education titled "The Revolution in Books." Organized 9 nationally recognized visiting experts to teach the institute, and selected 16 scholar-participants to study at the institute from a national pool of applicants, representing 12 states. This was possible through a \$141,929.00 Federal NEH grant. The application process took two years. Participants learned from experts about the history of print, gained hands-on experience at making paper, printing, and binding books, and reflected on how they might teach about books and print in their own classrooms.

Later in 2022, hosted an online conference at which Institute participants presented their lesson plans and ideas about how to communicate to students and the public about the history of printing. Attended live by 31 people. Recording is posted online.

FLORIDA ATLANTIC/HUNTINGTON LIBRARY WEINER FELLOWSHIP

Florida Atlantic University and the Huntington Library jointly offer three Collaborative Short-Term Fellowships to facilitate the research of advanced graduate students in the complementary holdings of the Weiner *Spirit of America* Collection and the Huntington Library. To create a collaborative scholarly community around the Weiner *Spirit of*

America Collection, all three fellows will be in residence at Florida Atlantic in Boca Raton, FL, simultaneously in each year in October.

Anecdotally, the Florida Atlantic/Huntington Library Weiner Fellowship has helped raise national awareness to the collection, for example:

• In Denver at the North American Conference on British Studies, FAU Faculty member Jason Sharples witnessed former fellow Eva Landsberg give a presentation that announced a new Digital Humanities project to reassemble

issues of "shadow newspapers" that are no longer in existence but can be pieced together from *other* newspapers' reprinting of segments from them (as was common practice at the time). The scholars in attendance found this to be a terrific idea. Landsberg stated that this was inspired by the Collection's unique item "Colonialism in North America and the West Indies: A Scrapbook of Newspaper Articles Relating to the British Colonies, 1757–1770" (JV1011 .C66 1757)

 Former fellow Shannan Mason reported recently that a Weiner Collection item was her "principal guiding source and visual aid" at the Society of Historians of the Early American Republic conference this summer, and it will now be a new chapter in her book.
